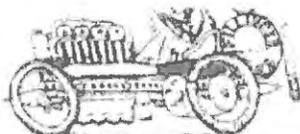

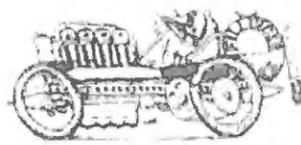
## RESTORATION PROPOSAL AND COST PROJECTION FOR 1925 BROCKWAY AMERICAN LAFRANCE FIRE ENGINE

Brian,

The following is a proposed work outline for the Brockway American LaFrance.

1. Truck will be photographed before work is started. Entire truck dismantled to the chassis including the removal of the engine with transmission and pump assembly.
2. All parts that are painted will be stripped to bare material. This will be done by several methods, sand media, chemical and glass bead. Tow hooks will be removed carefully and weld areas smoothed as best as possible. Any repairs needed will be done. Body parts will receive body type repairs done where necessary, sanded smooth as originally, primed, sealed and made ready for paint work. Chassis and body parts will be painted in original colors unless others specified.
3. Wheels and rims will be dismantled and stripped to bare material. Inspection of left front hub will be done and a recommendation will be made for what type of repair. Wheel spokes show heavy signs of moisture and it is recommended that new spokes be made and installed. Spokes to be painted and striped as original. All other wheel and rim parts to be painted as original.
4. Engine will be completely dismantled, cleaned, inspected and crack tested where possible. All engine machine work will be done to cylinder bores, pistons, new piston rings installed, valve seats, valve guides, crankshaft turned and polished. Valves inspected and ground or replaced as needed. New rod bearings will be poured and machined to crankshaft.

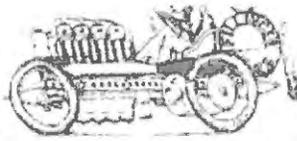

New main bearings will be poured, rough machined and line bored in crankcase. Camshaft inspected and re-profiled where necessary. It is understood the engine head has some issues. After crack testing and inspection recommendations for repair or replacement depending on availability will be made. Engine components will be rebuilt where necessary; these include carburetor, starter, generator, magneto, etc. Clutch will be rebuilt with new linings, plates and throughout bearing.

5. The drive line will be inspected and repaired where necessary this includes the transmission, rear end and connections. Replacing all lubricants. Front and rear axles and bearings will be inspected and replaced where necessary. Brake shoes inspected and relined. Brake drums inspected and machined where necessary. Steering system including steering box will be cleaned, inspected, made working and lubricated. New tires, tubes and flaps will be installed.
6. A new radiator core will be installed.
7. Seat upholstery work. Old upholstery to be completely removed. Any repairs to the seat wood and metal would be done if needed. New leather upholstery will be installed in the original pattern.
8. All bright work will be dismantled for preparation for plating work. Any plated parts needing repair will be repaired. Plating finish for this apparatus when new would have been nickel. Nickel finish will be applied unless other is specified.
9. Decoration will be as close to the original factory patterns as possible using 23K gold leaf striping and scroll work applied as originally. Other decoration accent striping will also be applied as originally, these include, black and ivory striping. Fire department name will be applied in the original lettering font if possible unless other is specified.

10. Fire equipment and accessories will be restored as close as possible to the original appearances. If items cannot be replaced with something suitable they will be refinished as best as possible. It is understood that the current ladder configuration will be retained and that it is suggested that the left rear fender be padded where the ladders touch to prevent damage.
11. Dash and steering wheel be restored as close as possible to original.
12. Hose bed wood floor will be replaced with new wood in the original pattern.
13. Gas tank will be cleaned internally and coated to help prevent corrosion.
14. Tail board will be replaced and covered in period original new reproduction American LaFrance pyramid matting. A correct period trim will be installed as well.

If these are found photos and recommendations for repair or replacement with costs will be submitted to you for approval before work would be done.

Materials and supplies; every effort will be made to obtain the supplies and materials mentioned and required for your restoration, keeping in mind the ever changing climate of supply issues with availability and related inflationary costs. Substitutions may have to be made and costs adjusted.

## TERMS AND CONDITIONS FOR RESTORATION SERVICES:

**ESTIMATES:** Vintage Vehicle Restorations Inc will attempt to make a non-binding rough projection and not an "estimate" of the best guess cost of the restoration services at the customer's request. In such event, a non-binding projection of cost for restoration shall be given which shall be based solely upon a cursory inspection of only the clearly visible areas of the vehicle, but which will not and can not account for conditions or situations not clearly visible or where the view of components is obstructed in any way such as the state of the engine and its components, transmission, drive shaft, axles, wheels, hubs, bearings, radiator, steering gear, etc. The rough projection will be based only upon the clearly visible appearance of the vehicle on the date of inspection and is not to be construed as a representation or opinion about the actual condition, and any latent, hidden, or concealed damage, or other conditions, problems or defects which may be revealed during the restoration process. Customer waives the right to a binding "estimate".

**FINDS AND DISCOVERIES:** Should Vintage Vehicle Restorations Inc., discover a particular condition involving the vehicle or its parts or components which reveals catastrophic damage, extreme deterioration or significant level of wear, such as cracked blocks or crank cases, rotted or cracked cylinder heads, exhaust manifolds or other castings, a cracked or broken crank shaft or cam shafts, broken, mismatched, or missing rods, pistons or bearings, or other major components, broken or excessively worn gears or shafts in transmission or differential, etc., Vintage Vehicle Restorations will endeavor to notify the customer about the condition. Customer and Vintage Vehicle Restorations, Inc., will explore the options available to address the condition, and customer will be requested to acknowledge in writing the plan to be undertaken.

**RESTORATIONS:** The Restoration of an antique vehicle is not an exact science. It is never possible to anticipate the kind or level of problems that can and will be encountered during the process. For that reason, the non-binding projection is not a fixed price proposal. The final bill for work done will inevitably differ from the projection and will be more or less based on the difficulty or ease of the restoration because of the unique and particular condition of the vehicle being restored. Customer acknowledges and agrees that because the vehicle is antique, Vintage Vehicle Restorations, Inc., is engaged to restore the same to essentially its original condition, with some modern advancements, and that the services to be performed by Vintage Vehicle Restorations Inc are not "repairs" that can be performed by a body shop or repair shop, but are more comprehensive and require specialized skill and knowledge not available in a repair shop, and that Vintage Vehicle Restorations, Inc., is therefore not a "Repair Shop" pursuant to Pa Code, Title 37, Section 301 et seq. Customer recognizes and acknowledges that the cost to restore the vehicle to its original condition with modern enhancements will probably exceed the value of the vehicle itself.

**PAYMENT:** In order to maintain our availability and attention directed to the customer's vehicle in our facility, every customer is expected to have and maintain a minimum deposit at all times during the Restoration process. "The Deposit". The full amount of the Deposit is required at the time the vehicle is left with Vintage Vehicle Restorations Inc. Progress billing will be rendered as work progresses. Payment will be withdrawn from the Deposit. In order to maintain the full amount of the Deposit and in order to continue with the Restoration Process, payment on invoices to replenish the Deposit is due no later than ten (10) days after the mailing of a progress billing. Failure to pay an invoice within thirty days of mailing authorizes Vintage Vehicle Restorations, Inc. to stop working on the vehicle, to remove the vehicle from the work area so that other vehicles can be worked on, and to place the vehicle in long-term storage. Should this happen, Customer agrees to pay a \$250.00 charge for the interruption in work and movement of the vehicle, and to pay \$65.00 per day storage charges. Payments in order to maintain the full Deposit for restoration work may be made by check. No vehicle may leave our premises until all outstanding invoices are paid in full, and not until confirmation that the check has cleared our bank.

The amount of the Deposit required throughout the Restoration: \$20,000.00

**PARTS:** If requested, we will accept customer supplied parts for evaluation only prior to the commencement of work. Vintage Vehicle Restorations, Inc., reserves the right to refuse to install any parts deemed to be of inferior quality or appearance, or that may create a dangerous condition, in its sole judgment and discretion. The performance of customer supplied parts shall be the sole responsibility of the Customer and Vintage Vehicle Restorations, Inc., assumes no responsibility for the compatibility or performance of customer supplied parts. Any additional services needed or charges associated with correcting parts that do not perform as specified by the manufacturer shall be the sole responsibility of the Customer.

**STORAGE CHARGES:** Customer agrees to charges for long term storage at \$65.00 per day. Customer will be notified as soon as work on the vehicle is stopped or completed. Storage charges of \$65.00 per day will be assessed on all cars not fully paid for and removed within 48 hours after notification that the invoice must be paid or the vehicle removed. Failure to respond to requests for advice or authorization from the Customer within 48 hours, or failure to pay a progress billing in full within thirty days of mailing, or failure to maintain the full amount of the Deposit will authorize Vintage Vehicle Restorations, Inc., to stop working on the vehicle, to remove the vehicle from the work area so that other vehicles may be worked on, and to place the vehicle in long-term storage. Should this happen, Customer agrees to a \$250.00 charge for the interruption in work and movement of the vehicle, and a \$65.00 per day storage charge until all charges and invoices are paid in full, the Deposit is restored, and the vehicle is picked up by the Customer or returned to the work area.

**POSSESSION:** An express artisan's or personal property lien is authorized and acknowledged by customer on the vehicle to secure the payment of the charges for restoration services, storage charges, interest charges, cost of collection, and other charges authorized by this agreement. No vehicle may leave our premises until all outstanding invoices and charges are paid in full.

**C.O.D. AND FREIGHT:** All freight and C.O.D. charges are the responsibility of the customer.

**MISCELLANEOUS SHOP SUPPLIES:** A 2.5% charge shall be added to all invoices for mechanical work and 5% for body and sheetmetal work to cover the untraceable cost of miscellaneous shop supplies.

**HAZARDOUS MATERIALS:** The customer is responsible for the payment of all cost to dispose of hazardous material found within the customer's vehicle.

**TAXES:** In addition to all charges as set forth above, Customer shall be responsible for all Local, State, and Federal sales and use taxes assessed upon the parts and services.

**INSURANCE:** Vintage Vehicle Restorations, Inc., maintains an insurance policy to cover both liability and physical damage. Customer is strongly urged to carry insurance commensurate with the value of the vehicle. We assume no responsibility to cover loss or damage which may exceed the limits of our insurance coverage. Customer represents and warrants that customer has and will maintain an insurance policy sufficient to cover the loss to the vehicle due to casualty or collision and comprehensive damage in an amount commensurate with the full value of the vehicle. Customer waives subrogation.

**INTEREST:** Customer agrees and authorizes Vintage Vehicle Restorations, Inc., to assess a service charge in the amount of 1.5% per month on the amount of all charges on progress billing not paid in full within 30 days of mailing.

**ATTORNEY'S FEES:** In the event of any claim or controversy between customer and Vintage Vehicle Restorations, Inc., for any reason including non-payment of invoices, and the same is referred by us to an attorney for resolution or collection, customer agrees to be responsible for, pay, and reimburse Vintage Vehicle Restorations, Inc., for all cost of such efforts including attorneys' fees incurred by us in the effort to resolve any such dispute and to collect unpaid charges.

**SUBCONTRACTORS:** Vintage Vehicle Restorations, Inc., will utilize the services of sub-contractors in the course of performing restoration work on your vehicle for which customer is responsible. Vintage Vehicle Restorations, Inc., has the right to add to the subcontractor's invoices a percentage for itself.

**PARTS AND COMPONENTS OF VEHICLES.** It is the customer's obligation and responsibility to collect any parts or components that Vintage Vehicle Restorations, Inc., determines will not be used in the restoration process, within 30 days of notice by Vintage Vehicle Restorations, Inc. to the Customer to collect and remove from the Vintage Vehicle Restoration, Inc., facility the parts or components identified by Vintage Vehicle Restorations, Inc. Vintage Vehicle Restorations, Inc., will contact the customer concerning the particular parts or components determined to be unnecessary to the restoration process. Should the Customer decline to collect and remove the particular parts or components identified by Vintage Vehicle Restorations Inc., as being unnecessary to the restoration process within 30 days of notice, customer hereby assigns ownership of the parts or components to Vintage Vehicle Restorations, Inc., and customer hereby grants Vintage Vehicle Restorations, Inc., the right to dispose, of or do with the property as it sees fit, all cost of disposal and transportation to be borne by the customer.

**TIME FOR PERFORMANCE:** The policy at Vintage Vehicle Restorations Inc is to maintain a time schedule that meets the Customer's needs, however, throughout the course of repair and restoration, delays can occur due to circumstances beyond our control. We will do our best, but do not make any guarantees that a job will be completed on a specific date or at a specific time.

**NO OBLIGATION TO COMPLETE RESTORATION:** Work on your vehicle may be discontinued at any time, for any reason, without penalty, in the sole and exclusive judgment and discretion of Vintage Vehicle Restorations, Inc. 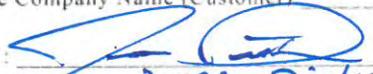

The Planning Commission has been working diligently on ordinance review – at it's first meeting in January they tackled Chapter 30 City Council, Officials and Organization. Following that, they reviewed Chapter 151 – Swimming Pools, Chapter 71 – Parking and finally Chapters 72-74 which cover regulating special vehicles. Following are the red lined versions of work completed to date.

The plan would be to bring the final, clean documents to the City Council's April 20<sup>th</sup> meeting where a public hearing will be held with the intent of adopting the new Ordinance language. You are receiving these red-lined documents now to allow yourself some time to look them over prior to the meeting. I will ask at each of the next couple of meetings if you have any concerns on the proposed change so we can discuss them – and hopefully have language that you will be comfortable adopting on the 20<sup>th</sup>.

§ 71.02 LIMITED PARKING.

No person shall stop, stand or park a vehicle upon the public streets of the city where official signs are erected limiting the parking time thereon, for a period of time in excess of the time as designated by the official signs.

§ 71.03 OTHER PARKING RESTRICTIONS.

(A) The City Council may by resolution order the placing of signs, devices or marks, or the painting of streets or curbs prohibiting or restricting the stopping, standing or parking of vehicles on any street where, in its opinion, as evidenced by a finding in its official minutes, the stopping, standing or parking is dangerous to those using the highway, or where the stopping, standing or parking of vehicles would unduly interfere with the free movement of traffic. The signs, devices, marks or painting shall be official signs, devices, marks or painting, and no person shall stop, stand or park any vehicle in violation of the restrictions thereon or as indicated thereby.

(B) "No parking" signs may be placed by city employees on any street of the city to permit construction, repair, snow removal, street cleaning or similar temporary activities. While the signs are in place, it shall be unlawful to park any vehicle on the streets or portion thereof so posted.

(C) It shall be unlawful for a person to park in an area designated by Council resolution and posted as a fire lane.

(D) It shall be unlawful for a person to park a vehicle or permit it to stand, whether attended or unattended, on an alley within the city, provided that this does not prohibit the parking of vehicles for less than one hour on an alley for the purpose of access to abutting property for loading or unloading merchandise or other material when parking on the property itself is not available.

(E) It shall be unlawful for a person to park a motor vehicle in an area designated by posted signs pursuant to Council resolution for certain types of vehicles, unless the motor vehicle is one of the types of vehicles specifically permitted.

(F) Every vehicle parked upon any street with a curb shall be parked parallel to the curb, unless angle parking is designated by appropriate signs or markings. On streets with a curb, the right-hand wheels of any vehicle parked shall be within one foot of the curb. On streets without a curb, the vehicle shall be parked to the right of the main traveled portion of the street and parallel to it and in such a manner as not to interfere with the free flow of traffic, unless angle parking is designated by appropriate signs or markings.

§ 71.04 SNOW REMOVAL PARKING RESTRICTIONS.

At any time after two inches or more of snow has accumulated on any public street or alley, whether the accumulation is due to new fallen snow or the drifting or blowing of snow from previous snowfalls, it is unlawful to ~~No person shall~~ park or leave standing any vehicle, car, truck, van, bus, trailer, camper (whether motorized or not), wagon, motorcycle, bicycle, snowmobile, or other object or piece of equipment on any public street or alley in the City of Cologne ~~after a snowfall of two inches or more in depth~~ until after the snow from

the street or alley has been removed or plowed to the curb or other street boundaries. Any vehicle left standing or parked under those conditions may be removed as hereinafter provided.

the zoning district. Damage to city streets because of repairs or lack of repairs shall be charged to the person responsible for the damage to the city streets.

§ 71.09 PROHIBITING PARKING AREAS IN FRONT YARDS IN RESIDENTIAL ZONES.

(A) The construction, operation or maintaining a parking area, either paved or unpaved, in the front yard of any lot is prohibited in any area zoned for residential use. For the purpose of this section, front yard shall mean and include that area between the sidewalk, or street line in the event there is no sidewalk, and the front line of the principal building, extending in both directions to the side lot lines.

(B) Use of that portion of a vacant lot within 30 feet of the sidewalk lines for parking in an area zoned for residential use is prohibited.

(C) Driveways in any area zoned for residential use shall not exceed 25% of the width at the front or side lot line. Where more than one driveway is desired or required, they shall be at least 70 feet apart.

(D) The front part of any lot shall not be used for the parking of an automobile, truck, trailer, tractor, recreational vehicle, camper, travel trailer, camper top, tent, wagon, boat, boat trailer, storage area or motor home.

(E) No person, being the owner or having control of any building, shall violate or fail to conform to any provision of this section, or fail to obey any lawful order of an officer charged with its enforcement. Each and every day on which any person continues to violate the provisions of this section, after having been notified of the violation, shall constitute a separate offense. This conviction shall not relieve any person from thereafter complying with the provisions of this section, and shall be sufficient cause to refuse further building or land use permits to the offender until a time as the orders have been complied with.

§ 71.10 IMPOUNDMENT.

Any police officer may order the removal of a vehicle from a street to a garage or other place of safety when the vehicle is left unattended and constitutes an obstruction to traffic or hinders snow removal, street improvements or maintenance operations. § 71.11 PRIMA FACIE VIOLATIONS.

Event parking – I saw a question about that but do not know what the concern is.

- A. If the concern is about narrow driving lanes, it is common on narrower streets to temporarily post no parking signs if the parking is such that two-way vehicular traffic cannot be maintained.
- B. If the concern is about parking for people that live in the area near the event, that unfortunately is a hazard of having the event. In limited instances, I have seen cities issue permit parking on certain streets but that is in force all the time. Common to see that either in residential areas near colleges or high schools as the parking problem occurs much of the year.

Provided all other applicable building permits are obtained, no separate building permit for fencing is required for pool walls or railing placed on top of pool walls.~~

All openings or points of entry into the pool area shall be equipped with gates or doors. All gates and doors shall have a latch which shall be so constructed and so placed as to be inaccessible to small children. All gates and doors shall be latched when the pool is not in use. Any opening between the bottom of the fence and the ground shall not exceed three inches. All fencing shall not have a distance of more than three inches between slats or sections.~~

In addition to items presented in the packet please see the following notes of interest:

- Completed the calculation for the fire protection township billings. Fire Chief Vos met with the townships on Thursday March 12<sup>th</sup> to provide department update.
- Annual meeting scheduled for March 18<sup>th</sup> with Paul Moline of Carver County Water Management Organization.
- Working with Betsy to Pysick to get the parade route and state highway closed for the Glad Days Parade.
- Tom Emmer’s office is now accepting projects/applications for federal earmark dollars. Jake Saulsbury tells me that water/wastewater projects typically do well with this program noting that the average award the last couple of rounds was \$1.2

million. That said, a recommended ask of \$4mil to \$6mil would be on the high end, but they do provide partial allocations so this would likely result in a smaller award amount. The application process according to Jake is simple and I have asked him to proceed with it. A quick summary of where we're at is as follows:

- \$22 million Total Project Cost
- \$1 million Capital Budget Request (Committed/Received)
- \$5 million State Appropriation (Requested)
- \$8 million PSIG Grant (Assumed to be Committed Soon)
- \$8 million Approximate Funding Gap

That all said, the submission was made week of March 2<sup>nd</sup> and I received a call from Rep Emmers Assistant encouraging us to submit to Amy Klobuchar and Tina Smith as well. Jake and the folks at Bolton and Menk tell me that Amy and Tina's portals are not open yet but will let me know when they are so we can submit there as well.

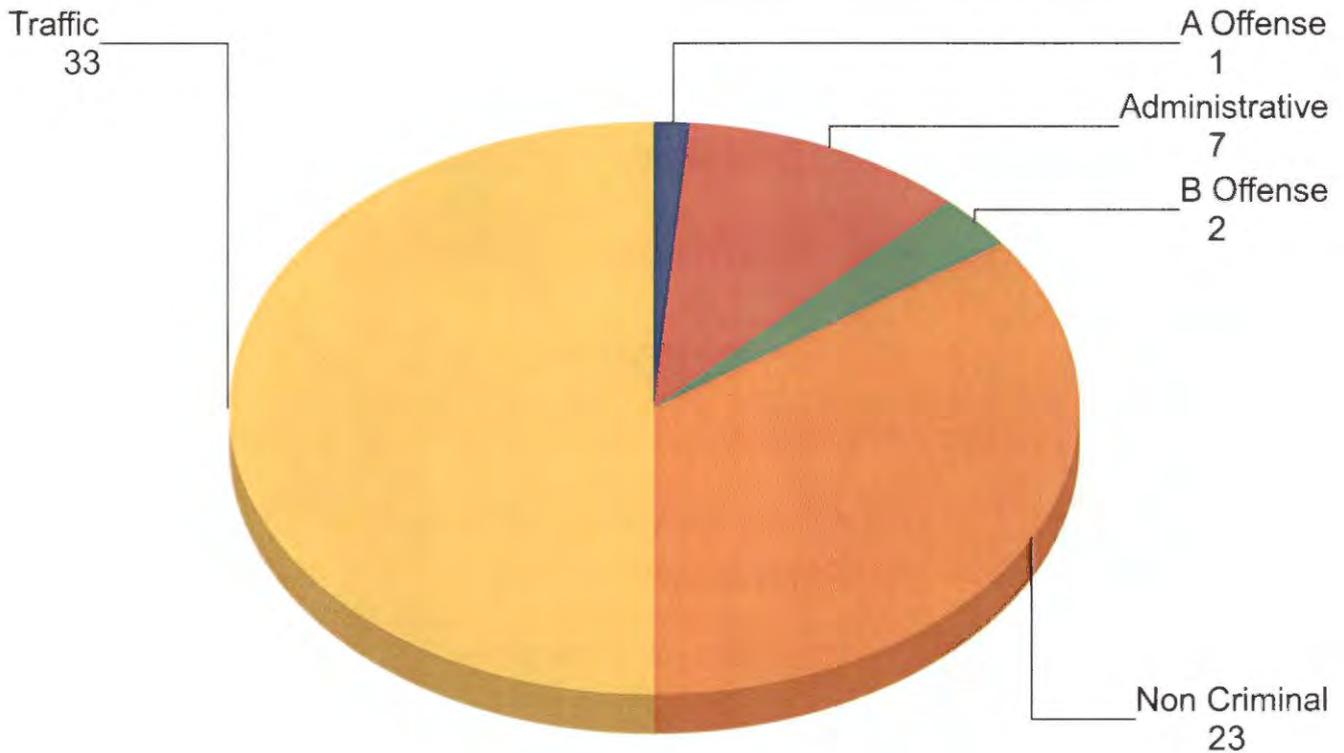

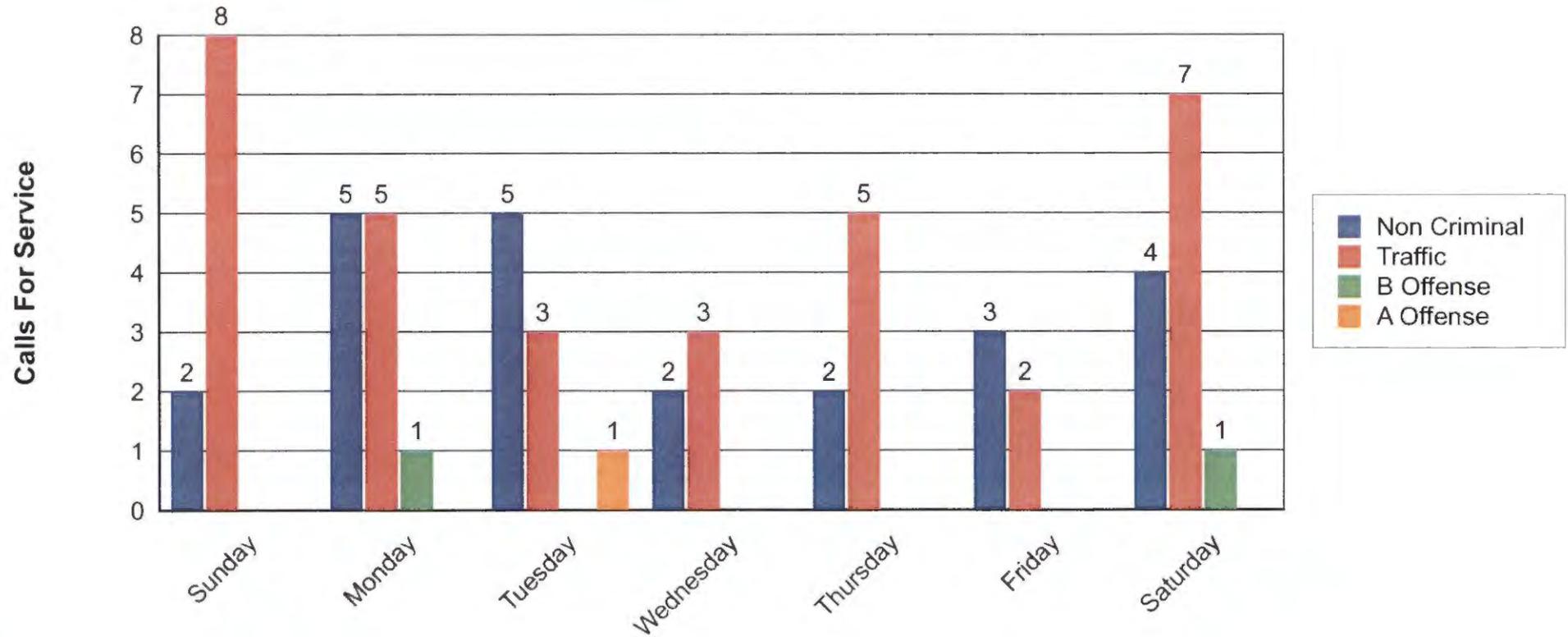

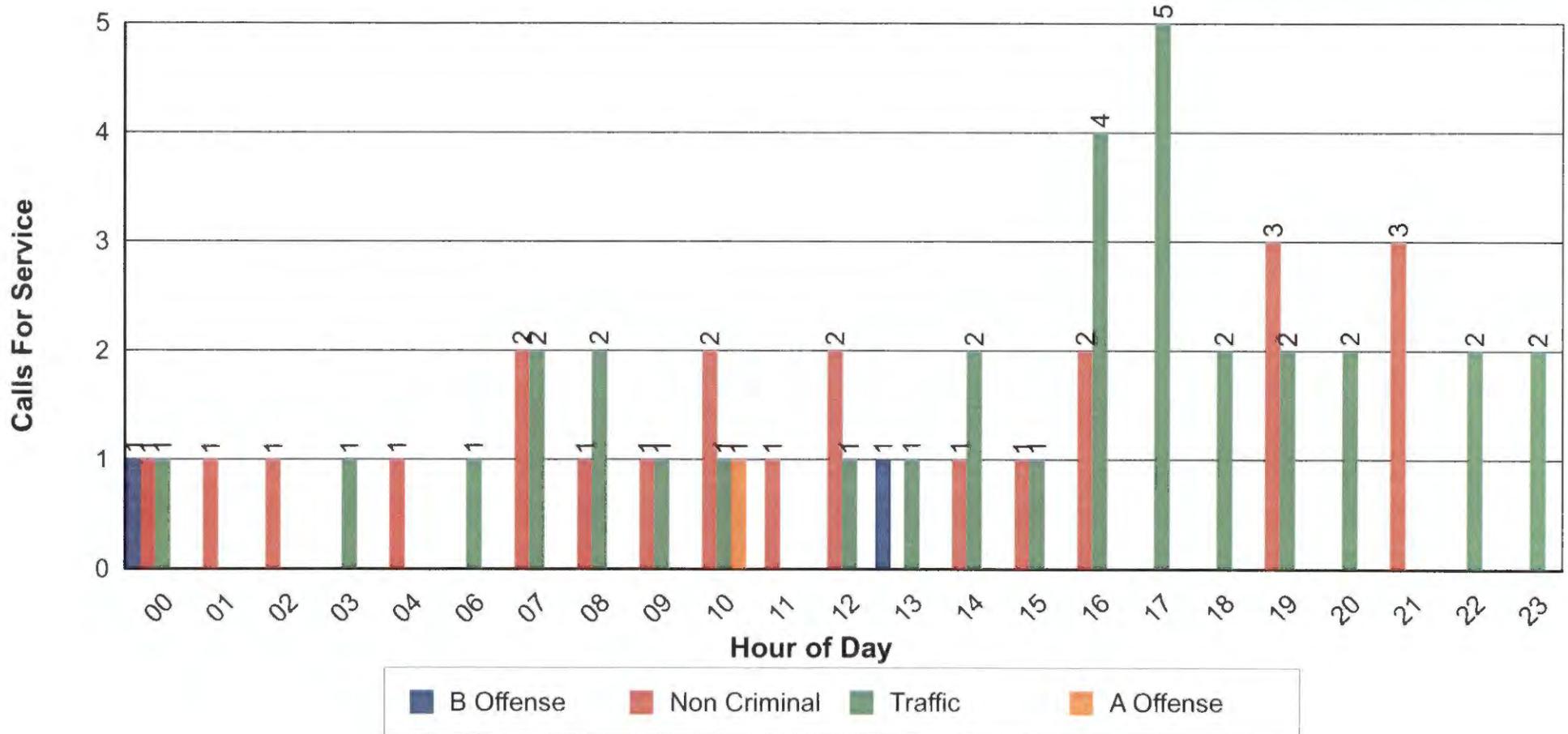
